Did you know amber has been reported for California?

Amber is fossilized plant resin and it has had many uses through the ages. For biologists like us, amber is most valued for its capability of preserving organisms exquisitely (see im-ages, below, contributed by author PRC). Author JASB has also been studying the chemistry of amber in collaboration with Dr. Joseph B. Lambert of Northwestern University. Although we have never seen samples of Californian amber, there are scattered reports of its existence. For instance, "true amber is found as small flecks in lignitic wood enclosed in Eocene rocks of Simi Valley, Ventura County", according to John Sinkankas (1959) author of Gemstones of North America (Volume 1). Also, Grantham and Douglas (1980. Geochimica et Cosmo-chimica 44: 1801-1810) reported "Pliocene amber from Ione Valley, California" consisting of "resinous earthy material". Finally, both of us remember hearing of amber from the Black Diamond Mine at Mount Diablo (Contra Costa County) associated with coal seams. We will appreciate receiving small samples (volume of a new

eraser on a pencil will suffice for chemical analyses) of amber from California or anywhere in the southwestern portion of the USA for chemical analyses.




HOW FOSSILS FORM

Fossils of hard mineral parts (like bones and teeth) were formed as follows:

- Some animals were quickly buried after their death (by sinking in mud, being buried in a sand storm, etc.).
- Over time, more and more sediment covered the remains.
- The parts of the animals that didn't rot (usually the harder parts likes bones and teeth) were encased in the newly-formed sediment.
- In the right circumstances (no scavengers, quick burial, lack of oxygen, not much weathering), parts of the animal turned into fossils over time.
- After a long time, the chemicals in the buried animals' bodies underwent a series of changes. As the bone laid buried, water infused with minerals seeped into the bone and replaced the chemicals in the bone with rocklike minerals. The process of fossilization involves the dissolving and replacement of the original minerals in the object with other minerals (and/or permineralization, the filling up of spaces in fossils with minerals, and/or recrystallization in which a mineral crystal changes its form).
- This process results in a heavy, rock-like copy of the original object - a fossil. The fossil has the same shape as the original object, but is chemically more like a rock! Some of the original hydroxy-apatite (a major bone constituent) remains, although it is saturated with silica (rock). Here's a flow chart of fossil formation:



There are six ways that organisms can turn into fossils, including:

- Unaltered preservation (like insects or plant parts trapped in amber, a hardened form of tree sap)
- Permineralization=petrification (in which rock-like minerals seep in slowly and replace the original organic tissues with silica, calcite or pyrite, forming a

rock-like fossil – can preserve hard and soft parts most bone and wood fossils are permineralized)

- Replacement (An organism's hard parts dissolve and are replaced by other minerals, like calcite, silica, pyrite, or iron)
- Carbonization=coalification (in which only the carbon remains in the specimen other elements, like hydrogen, oxygen, and nitrogen are removed)
- Recrystallization (hard parts either revert to more stable minerals or small crystals turn into larger crystals)
- Authigenic preservation (molds and casts of organisms that have been destroyed or dissolved). Most animals did not fossilize; they simply decayed and were lost from the fossil record. Paleontologists estimate that only a small percentage of the dinosaur genera that ever lived have been or will be found as fossils.

Most of the dinosaur skeletons that are shown in museums are not actually fossils! They are lightweight fiberglass or resin replicas of the original fossils.

Why are Fossils Rock-Colored?
Because they ARE rocks! A fossilized object is just a rocky model of an ancient object. A fossil is

composed of different materials than the original object was. During the fossilization process,

Water infused with minerals seeps into the bones. Over time, the original bones decay and are slowly replaced by rock-like minerals, or one mineral is replaced by another, or empty spaces are filled up with minerals. Fossils are formed.

the original atoms are replaced by new

minerals surrounding it, so a fossil doesn't have the same color (or chemical composition) as the original object. Fossils come in many colors and are made of many different types of minerals, depending on what the surrounding

rock matrix was composed of; one dinosaur bone is an opal.

Also, some fossils of skin (and other soft body parts) have been found. Again, the color of the skin is not retained during the fossilization process, all that remains today are a rocky model of the original.

Bench Tips

SOLDERING PRONGS:

I often use prongs to hold an irregular cab or other object on rings and pendants. But they're a little tricky to solder. You have to find some way to hold them all upright while soldering, and what looks like a strong joint sometimes turns out to be a fake. There's nothing worse than having a prong break off when you're setting the stone *#~*!

I solved both problems with one little trick. Locate and center punch the location for each prong. Then drill holes just a little smaller than your prong wire. Sand a small taper on the ends of your prong wires and insert them in the holes. The wires support themselves, soldering is easy, and the joint is stronger because of the increased soldering area.

TWISTING WIRE:

Twisting wires together can be done with an old hand drill but goes much faster with a power tool. My preference is to use a screw gun, although a Dremel or Foredom should do well. Just make a little hook out of coat hanger wire (or use a screw-in cup hook) and chuck it up in your screw gun. Fasten the ends of the wires in a vice and slip the other ends on your hook. Keep a little tension on the wires as you twist.

Note that a power drill is too fast a tool for this unless you have one with a variable speed control.

SMOOTHING EARWIRES:

Any time you make your own ear wires, the hardest part for me is to sand and polish the end that's inserted into the ear. Any sharp edge there is no fun. I've tried using sanding sticks, cup burs, and silicone polishing wheels. I've tried buffing on a Zam wheel, and I've tried spinning the wire in the Foredom to polish the tip. While all of these techniques do the job, none are very easy or fast.

Then it occurred to me - I could melt the wire smooth. One quick touch in the flame of the propane/oxygen Little Torch does the trick - not enough to form a bead on the wire but just enough to round off the tip.

DEALING WITH SILVER TARNISH-

Working with jewelry involves an ever increasing number of skills. Welcome to chemistry as one of them.

A tarnish is a discoloration caused by a chemical reaction between the metal and its environment. In this case you have the metal (Sterling is 92.5% silver and 7.5% copper) reacting with probably pollutants in the air around it.

Pollutants are typically sulfur compounds from the burning of petroleum fuels, but they can come from other sources. Pollutants react with the silver to form a grayish silver sulfide film on the surface. It's the stuff you have to polish off before using the good silverware for holiday dinner. I've heard of antitarnish strips you can buy from jewelry supply companies to pack near your stored items to prevent this tarnishing, but I have no direct experience with the product.

Any tarnish darker than the light gray makes me think the jewelry has come into contact with something that has some foreign chemicals in it. This could be a bag or a box that the jewelry was stored in. I once tarnished all the silver in a display case by putting a large specimen of iron pyrite in with the jewelry. Turns out pyrite is a sulfide!

Another cause of tarnish in Sterling jewelry is the copper in Sterling. It can react with oxygen in the air to form a copper oxide that's charcoal in color. This happens quickly when the silver is heated up to several hundred degrees, but probably builds up slowly and room temperatures as well. The oxide is easily removed by an acid pickle.

Bottom line from my experience is that tarnish can

never be completely eliminated, but it can be slowed way down by three things:

Depletion gilding your pieces so that the outer layer is a pure silver surface.

Store jewelry in plastic bags when not in daily use. Periodic rubbing it with a flannel polishing cloth.

MAGNETIC HOLDER FOR FILES-

An easy way to keep all your files organized at the bench is to use a magnetic tool strip. They're not expensive and help keep a lot of small tools from cluttering the bench top. I got a couple of them from Harbor Freight for about \$5 each. Only regret was putting some of my small drills on the magnets. The drills got a little magnetized and now stick together when I carry them in a bottle in my tool box.
