

Fleches D'Amour

Intriguing name, isn't it? If you are French, or a student of French, you know the name means "arrows of love". The phrase "fleches d'amour" is used to describe the coppery needles of rutile (titanium dioxide) often seen penetrating clear quartz. This is usually called rutile in quartz, but it can also be called Sagenite.

Sagenite is defined as an acicular variety of rutile occurring in groups of crystals crossing at 60° and often enclosed in quartz or other minerals. Acicular means needle shaped or slender, like needles or bristles.


Research shows that needle-shaped minerals such as black tourmaline, goethite stibnite, asbestos, hornblende, and epidote are included in the

minerals that can occur as Sagenite. All the needle-shaped minerals are not always enclosed in quartz, but more frequently may be found in chalcedony. The grouping of crystals in tufts radiating from a focal point

along a cavity is later filled with chalcedony or quartz. The color of the tufts and that of the surrounding material will vary and create the large assortment of magnificent specimens that we see and admire.

Additional clarification from Bob Jones at <u>Gems and Minerals</u> Magazine. The term is applied most often to rutile in quartz or agate. but it actually means any needle-like crystal spray enclosed in something transparent, most often quartz or agate. It can be tourmaline, actinolite, etc.

Terms like Fleches d'amour, Venus hair stone, and Cupid's darts, are applied, again mainly to rutile in quartz. If the needles are black tourmaline then it is called Thetis Hairstone.




