One of my goals was to try to have programs meeting the desires of the club members. Based on a survey responded to by half of our members a year ago, we have had programs on Wire wrapping, dinosaurs, gold prospecting, agates of the world, soapstone carving, and ice age fossils (among others).

We have tried to have a field activity every other month, and have pretty much succeeded on that score too, with Wayne's trip to the Ventura Club Museum in January, Wes's trip to Ozena in March, the Tailgate at the Von Achen's in May, Annual meeting field trip to the Porter Ranch in June, Stan Ferguson's trip to Willow Creek in August, the Von Achen's trip to the Benitoite mine in

He became CFMS Treasurer in 1997 and 1998. He held 3 other CFMS positions around that time as well. In 2002 he was inducted into the National Rockhound and Lapidary Hall of Fame upon my recommendation, and he was also made our Member of the Year that year.

He has been president of OMS three times (1989, 1995 and 1996), OMS Golden Bear recipient in 1996, CFMS Director and OMS Treasurer forever, assistant bulletin editor and computer technician for many years, and has organized and taken care of the dealers at our shows for as long as I can remember. KIDZ ROCKS

Earlier this year, CFMS Visual Programs Chair Sharon Rogow alerted me to "Kidz Rocks, Inc.," an on-line business out of Canoga Park, CA, founded and run by Alan Scalone. Per his website, Alan notes a goal of providing "minerals that foster children's curiosity in the world around them and a love of learning; minerals with vibrant colors, unique crystal shapes and interesting combinations of minerals that not only attract a child's interest but provide excellent learning opportunities." I've explored his website and I'm happy to report he has succeeded!

Kids can buy individual specimens, pre-made collection kits, or build their own custom collection kits with 100 rock, mineral, and fossil specimens to choose from. Most specimens are larger than 2 to 3 inches, not the little chips often sold by scientific supply houses. Kidz Rock also offers smaller sized bagged minerals for use by teachers and schools, or by junior leaders of local gem and mineral societies. Prices are kept deliberately low by Alan purchasing directly from miners (or collecting himself) and minimizing middlemen. And he provides FREE education pages. Beneath photos of the rocks offered is a clickable "Learn about This Rock" link that pulls up information about the chemistry and characteristics of the mineral, the origin of its name, where it's found, how it's used, and fun facts on colorful sheets that can be downloaded and printed. Some of the links also include brief educational video clips. And you can sign up for a newsletter.


CUTTING A BOLT

Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to restore any distorted threads. The

problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.

First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt in a vise by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt. Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.
