June is here. Coronavirus is still with us and while we seem to be "flattening the curve", and SLO County is "opening" we

The shelter at home order has started to allow opening. San Luis County has received a county specific release to start opening up and has begun their opening plan. Santa Barbara has not yet received the release but is expected to soon.

BIRTHSTONE(S) FOR JUNE Pearl & Alexandrite From Wikipedia..

While Pearl is not a stone or a mineral due to its organic origins, it is a gem, both the natural and cultured varieties. Pearls are caused bu sand grains that irritate the fleshy part of an Oyster. The oyster respobnds by coating the sand grain woith Nacre, a form of calcium carbonate (calcite) that also comprises the shelkl of bivalves like clams and oysters.

Alexandrite is one of the rarest of colored stones. It is a member of the Chrysoberyl Group with a formula of Beryllium aluminum oxide. Alexandrite, a strongy pleochroic (trichroic) gem, will exhibit emerald green, red and orange -yellow colors depending on viewing direction in partially polarised light.

LOCAL ROCKS-- AMMONITE (Point Sal) Text and picture by Wayne Mills, Ore-Cutts Editor,

After I left Caltrans I inherited the collection of fossils that I had put together as District Paleontology Coordinator. One of the fossils that was in the collection was collected from near Jalama Beach . It is an ~70,000,000 year old ammonite from the Cretaceous aged Point Sal Formation. Since the ~24,000,000 year old Seven Sisters were formed near Palmdale, CA, and have been rafted northward to their current location in the intervening years, It would be fascinating to know where this ammonite was originally deposited. It is about 9 inches at its widest point, so the fossil would have been about 18 inches in diameter when it was deposited. .The largest ammonite ever found came from Germany— it is 6 feet in diameter.





Bottom picture is of the exposed suture lines. The suture

pattern is one way that ammonite species are identified. But don't ask what species this one is. Ammonites were one of the genera that went extinct at the end of the Cretaceous Period. Amazingly, the Nautiloids, which are also cephalopod molluscs, survived the Cretaceous extinctions.



The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
