## All About the Adopt-A-Highway Program

Orcutt Mineral Society has participated in California Department of Transportation's (Caltrans's) Adopt-A-Highway Program since 1993. (I joined the Society in 1994). A long-time member of our Society, Bick Strader, managed the program from 1993 to 1997 when Marshall Reeves took over. Marshall had the job until he, his wife Glenda, and their two children moved to Oregon in 2008. At that time, I took the job over.

During his tenure as AAH Chair, Marshall devised a clever strategy for carrying two separate trash bags at the same time (one for trash, and one for cans and (plastic) bottles which we recycle). His strategy consisted of a 23" section of 3/4" PVC pipe, and 2 small hand clamps with a 1.25" opening capacity. I dubbed this device "The Marshall Plan", and more recently, "Pick-up Stix". To use, simply put the inside edges of two trash bags together and place the pipe inside the edges, then make a couple of rolls until you can place the clamps near either end of the assembly. Now you are ready to pick up trash (after you

put the rest of your gear on). You need: sturdy shoes and warm enough clothing, and a hard hat, gloves, vest and picker (supplied by OMS). Then you need to know what section you are cleaning.

OMS has been assigned the first two miles of Route 166 East of Highway 101. We have divided our section (which is marked beginning and end with signs bearing our society name) into 4 main sections. These are: Section one: the parking area at the southeast corner of Routes 101/166, Section two: both sides of the highway from Thompson Avenue east to the first farm driveway and back to the parking lot. Remember to walk facing traffic. The third section goes from the second farm driveway on the north side of the highway back to the end of section two and back on the north side of the highway. Section four goes from the driveway marking the end of Section 2 to the highway sign marking the end of our clean-up area about 2 miles east of Highway 101.

We begin our clean up at 8:00 AM on the Second Saturday of odd numbered months. (So six clean-ups per year usually.) The clean-up takes about 1.5-2 hours depending on how "dirty" the highway is. In our 29 years of highway clean-ups we have found some interesting things. Note the article "Cleaning-up" in the October, 2022 Ore-Cutts. After our work is done, we often meet at Francisco's Country Kitchen in Santa Maria for conversation, coffee and treats. Our Wes Lingerfelt, a member of the National Lapidary Hall of Fame, has been doing the clean-ups longer than anyone who currently participates in them. Wes donates an "incentive prize" to each of our after clean-up meetings, and the names of all participants in that day's clean-up (present or not) are put in a hat. Our waitress Shelly usually draws the winner who is often Mr. Lingerfelt!

In April of 2022, we received a letter from Caltrans announcing a "Stipend Program" which we decided to participate in. We sent in articles about our clean-up, and pictures of the bags we collected, and some of the things that we found. After our May and July Clean-ups, we received a check from the State of California for \$500! A pretty nice reward for our clean-up efforts.

## The Bolivian Death Switch

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A Summation of an article written by Rock H. Currier

A few months ago, Jan Ferguson passed on an article written by Rock H. Currier in 1994. I was hoping to attach a link to a website featuring the article, but I didn't find any. In 1994 the internet was not as accessible as it is now and it seems that the photo copy of a printed rockhound newsletter is the only remnants of this fascinating article. I will do my best to sum up the 6 page article for you here, but please reach out for a copy if you would like the whole article to read.

Rock Currier and his friend, Gary Moss, decided to travel to Bolivia together in 1993. They made arrangements to travel to Cochabamba, a city 8000 feet above sea level. Contrary to popular belief, Cochabamba has the largest statue of Christ in the world. Their statue is 1 meter taller than the statue in Rio de Janeiro. In Cochabamba the pair made arrangements to visit some of the old mines in the area.

In 1993 the economic status of Bolivia was very poor. Many of the old mines were abandoned due to equipment failures and no money to fix them. Some of the locals were moving out of the area to find better work, and some turned to drug dealing. It was one of these drug dealers that may have provided the 4 wheel drive vehicle that Rock and Gary needed to rent while they were in Bolivia.

They headed off to Oruro which was a mining town which had mostly closed up. Nothing to buy or collect there. Onward to parts unknown. Along with no internet in 1993, there was also no navigation on a cell phone (if you could even afford to own one). The guys took off with hand drawn maps that were full of errors, no idea where the next gas station would be, and drove down sketchy dirt roads full of sand. Eventually they made it to Salar de Uyuni which is the largest salt flat in the world and easily seen in the distance.

The town of Uyuni was a tiny town in 1993 and may still be today. The pair checked into a hotel with the desire of getting into a hot shower to wash the off the dust from the road. What they found was a communal bathroom with a very suspicious water heating device. The water pipe was directly wired with what appeared to be bare electrical wires carrying 220 volts that was supposed to instantly boil the water coming out of the shower head. There was only a tiny plastic knob to turn on the electricity. There was plenty of opportunities to accidentally touch the live circuit. Standing in water with a little soap on the body was a perfect conductor for the electric current.

The suspect showers in Bolivia did little to detour Rock and Gary and they spent quite an adventurous trip going from town to town finding and buying specimens from the local miners. They even ended up on TV showing the locals how to wrap specimens in paper to protect them. In the end, the two collected many specimens that they could sell back in the states just in time for the Tucson Gem and Mineral Show. They made the return trip back to the starting point of Cochabamba and both lived to tell the tale of their encounter with the Bolivian Death Switch.

The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
